English / HSIE / Geography Faculty News

This Term, students have been working on the following units:

Year 7 Humanities	Have been learning about the Aristotelian principles of persuasion (Ethos / Logos / Pathos) and how to apply these to convince others of a cause that they themselves feel strongly about. Hopefully they have developed a fire in the belly to become more socially active!
Year 8 Humanities	Have been studying one of the oldest narratives of all time – The Hero's Journey. They have interrogated what constitutes a hero in the past, in other cultures, and in fiction. Hopefully, they have reflected on their own heroic qualities throughout!
Stage 5 English	Have spent the term uncovering how a range of individuals have, through their poetry, art or film, represented the construct of war. Students have compared Government propaganda to real life, first-hand depictions of war, and have duly noted Wilfred Owen's "old Lie": that it is sweet and right to die for one's country.
Stage 5 History	Have spent the term looking at Popular Culture and investigating the various cultures associated with each decade from the 50s onwards. They have particularly enjoyed viewing and learning about the changes in fashion and music over the past 70 years.
Stage 5 Geography	Have spent the term investigating how and why people move between places, most notably from rural areas into more metropolitan spaces. This culminated into students' designing their own sustainable and liveable city designs, many of which were highly creative, eco-friendly and well designed.

During Week 8 the Stage 6 Visual Design and the Aboriginal Studies classes embarked on an excursion to Sydney. We all caught the train down overnight where the students got to experience the novelty of attempting to sleep sitting up while brimming with excitement.





We arrived at 7am and got straight into our day's activities. It was a very brisk morning as we began to explore the city. We meandered through Darling Harbour on our way to Barangaroo Point where Mr Wheeler talked through the history of Bennelong and a dreaming story of the Harbour.

The first gallery we visited was the MCA where students got an interesting perspective on idea of place as we examined artworks from their permanent collection bringing together different concepts of time and place.



We spent the rest of the day exploring the Botanical Gardens and recovering from the train ride. That night we ventured into China Town for dinner and then attended SandSong - performed by the Bangara Dance Theatre at the Opera House. Students were in awe of the production and the sheer feelings that the piece evoked. This was an incredible experience for us all.

The next day we attended the NSW Gallery where we explored the Archibald and Sulman Prize. This was a great experience as the winner depicts a local artist. Students were again moved by the vast array of ways that portraits were depicted.

We also saw Daniel Body's Treasure Island which explored the concepts of colonial histories in Australia, from an Indigenous perspective.

During the rest of our stay we spent evenings dancing to the live music around the city and viewing Vivid. It was a beautiful experience where students found exciting possibilities for the future and experienced a small piece of city life.


