PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 1 seems to be flying by. The school plan for 2024 is almost ready to be published with the following improvement measures around attendance, reading, numeracy and HSC and pathways.

- 1. An increase in the number of whole days that students attend school in both primary and secondary.
- 2. Growth in reading.
- 3. Growth in numeracy
- 4. Increase in the number of students achieving in the top two bands for the HSC.

Attendance

As a parent I am fully aware that getting the kids up and out the door for school every morning can be a challenge. However regular attendance is an important factor for student success. Success can look very different for each student. Consistent attendance ensures that learners stay on top of their studies, the concepts they are learning in the classroom lead on from each other so missed days creates gaps and a disconnect in learning and in social interactions. By being present in the classroom, students receive the necessary guidance and support from their teachers to thrive in their learning. Regular attendance also helps our kids build strong friendships and social skills, as they interact with their peers on a daily basis. These interactions are invaluable for their social development and overall well-being.

Attending school regularly instills essential life skills such as responsibility, discipline, and time management in our children. Establishing a consistent routine not only helps them stay organised during their school years but also lays a foundation for success in their future endeavours. By being present at school, students have access to various resources and opportunities, including libraries, counselling services, and extracurricular activities, which enrich their educational experience.

We have a number of activities we will be rolling out across the year to promote attendance and look forward to working together with families.

Reading

By encouraging children to read, we are opening doors to endless possibilities. Reading not only enhances their language skills but also fosters creativity, critical thinking, and empathy. It's a fundamental tool that equips students with the necessary skills to navigate through life's challenges and opportunities.

Incorporating reading into family routines can make a significant difference. To promote reading at school we have weekly library sessions for K-10 students. The Library is a welcoming space and a lot of planning goes into the books that we keep in the Library so they meet the needs of our students. We aim to collect some data this term and then again in Term 4 to see the impact of our reading initiatives this year.

Numeracy

Our focus on Numeracy will take hold in Term 3 to allow time for growth in reading. I remember attending Music lessons in primary school during a Math session and as a result I had gaps in my learning which had an impact in high school. This led to me developing a particular mindset about my ability in Math. Later in life I was given an opportunity to teach both Year 9 and 10 Math and this reinforced how important it is to make the learning relevant. I have used every concept covered in math class in my life as an adult, particularly financial literacy. Parents play a crucial role in nurturing their children's numeracy skills from an early age. One of the simplest yet most effective ways parents can help is by incorporating numbers and math into everyday activities. Whether it's counting objects during playtime, measuring ingredients while cooking together, or calculating change while shopping, these real-life scenarios provide valuable opportunities for practical learning. Additionally, parents can encourage a positive attitude towards math by praising effort rather than just outcomes and by making math fun through games, puzzles, and apps. Creating a supportive learning environment at home where questions are welcomed and mistakes are seen as opportunities for growth fosters a sense of confidence and curiosity in children. For older students, encouraging them to try their best, problem solve, show their working, make mistakes, practice and, most importantly, have a positive mindset will all help in developing a skill set they will need in life.

HSC and Pathways

We have elected to continue with a similar goal to last year in relation to the HSC. This is due to the fact that most HSC students at Nimbin Central elect to do an ATAR pathway and our planning cycle is drawing to a close so making a change at this late stage will be difficult to measure impact. While academic achievement is a success measure, it is not the only one and I expect into the future we will have a very big focus on career awareness and pathways that begins in Kindergarten.






When it comes to attending school, every day matters


