KINDERGARTEN/YEAR 1

On Mondays, our Kindergarten / Year 1 class received a letter of invitation to read to our school Jarjum Mirr playgroup group. Our students look forward to sharing this time with the playgroup children, often making guesses as to who will be there when we visit. In preparation, K/1 engage in guided choral and instructed guided reading to build their confidence and reading to our playgroup children.

Not only are K/1 practicing their literacy skills, but they are also developing their sense of belonging in their school environment.

In school, a sense of belonging gives students feelings of security, identity, and community, which, in turn, support academic, psychological, and social development (Jethwani-Keyser, 2008).

K/1 are also joining Year 3,4,5 for buddy reading. The students take turns reading to each other, choosing from class readers and a wide variety of texts.

When students are reading to another person, it naturally motivates them to practice reading fluently and to read with expression. Students are developing comprehension skills by sharing their ideas and opinions of the books they are reading.

Buddy reading with peers builds a student's sense of belonging. These fundamental benefits for children and young people have flow-on benefits for their learning and engagement with school.

It was wonderful to see the Years 3,4,5 take a leadership role and demonstrate their patience and care with our younger students.

Theatre at Nimbin Central School

Year 11 and 12 Drama students at Nimbin Central School have powerful things to say.

This Term, the class have been learning unique and powerful theatre styles from history and other cultures, ranging from the hyperbolic acting and action in Melodramas, through to the alienating and political forms of Bertolt Brecht's Epic Theatre. Using this learning, I tasked them with building their own original pieces of theatre designed to leave a powerful impression on their audiences.

Within days, the groups detailed to me what they wanted to say and how they wanted to say it:

- * using dark melodrama to comment on how years of oppression at the hands of males has resulted in females turning on each other
- * using Brecht's episodic form to examine the etymology of Aussie Tall Poppy Syndrome
- * using Artaud's Theatre of Cruelty and disturbingly synchronised choreography to satirise life in the rat race.

After weeks of rigorous research and rehearsal, the students presented their pieces to an audience of their parents, carers, peers and school staff - to rapturous applause.

This performance was a great point of reflection for our budding young thespians, who will take this experience into a new, more demanding group performance for their Higher School Certificate.

Congratulations to them all for their bravery, passion and energy.
