Welcome Back to Term 3!




Welcome back to Term 3!



- Jagun Alliance ran informative and thought-provoking sessions that explored Indigenous history, cultural practices, and the deep spiritual connection to land. Their workshops empowered students with knowledge and appreciation for the richness of Bundjalung heritage.
- Wollumbin Dreaming engaged students through meaningful discussions and hands-on art
 activities, where stories and symbols came to life in stunning mural work and creative expressions.
 The collaborative artwork created during the day will serve as a lasting reminder of what was
 learned and shared.
- Flow Projects brought movement into the mix, leading dynamic sessions that encouraged students to connect to their bodies and surroundings through dance and physical expression inspired by traditional forms. These workshops brought energy and joy to the day.
- Indigenous games and performances added another layer of excitement, allowing students to
 experience traditional forms of play and storytelling in interactive ways. Music echoed through the
 school grounds, providing a rhythm that united students in celebration and reflection.

'Making Their Mark" - Nimbin Central Students Create Spiralling Pool Mural

Students at Nimbin Central School are making waves in the community — quite literally — through a vibrant new public art project that is transforming the floor of the local swimming pool into a stunning spiralling mural of aquatic life.

What started as a conversation with local caravan park and pool owner, Greg Young, has turned into a dynamic, cross-curricular learning experience for our Stage 4 and 5 students. The mural begins with freshwater creatures and gradually transitions into reef and deep-sea marine life, spiralling inward to symbolise depth, growth, and creative energy.

This project is not just about painting a pool — it's about engaging students in real-world learning that extends beyond the classroom. Under the guidance of Visual Arts teacher Yeleena Paolucci, students are developing essential skills in design, problem-solving, teamwork, and public art practices, while also experiencing the personal impact of contributing something meaningful to their community.

Our Stage 4 and 5 Theatresports groups have joined the project to support team engagement and morale, with many students expressing how much they look forward to being part of something big and visual. Their involvement has boosted attendance and teamwork, with students taking pride in their contribution to the shared experience.

Meanwhile, Stage 5 Photography students are documenting the entire process as part of their unit 'Through the Lens' on photojournalism and social documentation. They will be interviewing peers, filming progress, and capturing powerful moments that will soon be edited into a student-produced short film showcasing the story behind the mural and its community impact.

The mural is already attracting curiosity and praise from locals who stop by to admire the transformation. And for our students, the experience has been nothing short of inspiring.

"It's so cool to be doing something that will be here for years," said one student. "We're making our mark — and it feels like we're really part of the community."

Stay tuned — this is just the beginning of what promises to be a powerful and lasting story of youth creativity, community pride, and learning through art.








BOOK WEEK: BOOK PARADE


CHECK IN ASSESSMENT FOR YEAR 3 - 9

Dear parents and carers,

During Term 3 students will participate in the Check-in assessment. The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online literacy and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs. Students with disability may receive the same level of support during the assessment they would normally receive in the classroom.

- The assessment will be scheduled for our students during Weeks 3 8
- All students complete a reading assessment and a numeracy assessment.
- Year 6 students will also complete a writing assessment.

Nimbin Central School student William Quinn Dowling will soon be jetting off to Space Camp USA with other space enthusiasts thanks to One Giant Leap Australia and a grant for Student Science Engagement and International Competitions from the Department of Industry, Science and Resources.

After participating in One Giant Leap Australia's regional Aerospace Camp in Inverell in 2024, "Quinn" was inspired to take part in his next exciting adventure.

Space Tour USA, from One Giant Leap Australia, will take the group of young space explorers to the renowned Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama, from 28 October to 9 November 2025.

Space Camp USA, which has been operational for over 42 years and has more than one million alumni, is an internationally recognised program based on NASA astronaut training and focuses on teamwork and leadership skills. One Giant Leap Australia has provided tours to Space Camp since 2015 and the space education organisation is excited to return.

The tour's itinerary includes visits to Disneyland, California Science Centre, Serrano Intermediate School, and the Griffith Observatory. The schedule also features a day of STEM activities with One Giant Leap's USA STEM expert, dinner with NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory scientists and engineers, and a visit to Space Camp USA.

If you or someone you know would like to take part in Space Tour USA, expressions of interest for 2026 are now open.






Dear parents, guardians and carers,

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- Year of schooling
- · Category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- Level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- Formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- Consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- Develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. School Drop Off

Important reminder to all Parents, Carers and Families when dropping off and collecting students from school. **Students must not be dropped off or collected from the 'Staff' Carpark.**Parents/Carers should use the top visitor carpark, or the Cullen Street carpark.

Please reduce speed when entering Thorburn Street, Cullen Street and the school carpark. Despite presenting road safety education in the classroom, when children get out of school they are not thinking about cars. They want to have fun and their eagerness can often override their caution in traffic. The peripheral vision of a young child is a third narrower than the peripheral vision of an adult. Children are also physically smaller, so they have difficulty seeing vehicles and being seen by drivers, and are therefore more vulnerable to serious injury. Because of their size, and with the highly unpredictable nature of children, always slow down when driving around schools or risk a fine, demerit points, or worse — losing a child's life.



WATCH OUT KIDS ABOUT

Other tips to remember when driving around schools:

- Be alert when driving past a stationary bus as children often dash out in front of and from behind buses to cross the road.
- Never double park or park in 'no stopping' zones.
- When you see a School Crossing Supervisor, obey their instructions. The supervisor will step onto the road and display the STOP sign. You must STOP and wait until the pedestrians have crossed the road and the supervisor has returned to the kerb before proceeding.
- Don't park on pedestrian (zebra) crossings it is also illegal to stop or park 20 metres before, or 10 metres after a pedestrian crossing. It makes it difficult for children to cross, and for other motorists to see children.
- Don't park in no-stopping zones or use them as drop off areas. No Stopping means DO NOT STOP HERE for any reason unless obeying an official direction.
- You can drop off or pick up passengers in a 'No Parking' or a 'Stop, Drop and Go' zone as long
 as the vehicle is not left unattended and you exit the zone within two minutes. If the school
 has a passenger set down area, use it. If not, park your car on the same side of the road as the
 school so your child doesn't have to cross the road. If you have to park on the other side of the
 road, escort your child across the road. Never call the to cross the road.


