

In between all of this, there has also been plenty of great teaching and learning going on!



Bundjalung Day Speech July 1 2019

Before I begin I would also like to acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land on which we are meeting today, the Widgibul people of the Bundjalung Nation, and pay my respects to elders past, present and emerging, for they hold the memories, the traditions, the culture and hopes of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples across the nation.

I find the 2019 NAIDOC Week theme – VOICE, TREATY, TRUTH, LET’S WORK TOGETHER FOR A SHARED FUTURE – extremely hopeful, full of possibilities and particularly relevant for Nimbin Central School at this point in time.

As many of you may be aware, we as a school have been working hard to provide the best possible opportunities for our Aboriginal students and best possible Aboriginal Education for all, and this has led to some new initiatives at the school over the past 12 months or so that we are very proud of and which fit well with this theme.

Firstly – VOICE. It is important to recognise that the Indigenous voice of this country is over 65 000 years old and that it is the voice of the oldest continuing culture on the planet. While voice can mean many things, it certainly means language and the recognition that language is precious as the carrier of lore, culture and knowledge. We are proud that here at Nimbin Central School we have introduced Bundjalung language classes this year with the support and able tutoring of Uncle Gilbert Laurie. I feel this is particularly important and meaningful as 2019 is being celebrated as the United Nations International Year of Indigenous Languages. And of course, we now have our Yarning Circle, a great place to have a voice.

Secondly – TREATY. As I know many of you learnt yesterday, Australia is one of the few liberal democracies around the world which still does not have a treaty or some other kind of formal acknowledgement or arrangement with its Indigenous people. This being the case I feel, however, that we here at Nimbin central School are working towards Makarrata. (Makarrata is a word from the language of the Yolngu people in Arnhem Land. The Yolngu concept of Makarrata captures the idea of two parties coming together after a struggle, healing the divisions of the past and seeking to make things right.) And this is the aim of our newly established Nimbin Central School Aboriginal Education Group which brings together students, parents, teachers and the community to work together for this goal.

Thirdly – TRUTH. The true story of colonisation must be told, must be heard, must be acknowledged. And here at Nimbin Central School our next initiative as part of our Aboriginal Education Plan is to ensure that these true Aboriginal perspectives are truly embedded in ALL class programs and used in the everyday classroom practice of ALL teachers in the school. This is not just the history of our First Peoples. It includes know-how, practices, skills and innovations - found in a wide variety of contexts, such as agricultural, scientific, technical, ecological and medicinal fields, as well as biodiversity-related knowledge.

I am extremely proud of the steps Nimbin Central School is currently taking to work towards this theme and look forward to maintaining this momentum.

Now that our Peer Leaders have been trained, our whole school will be starting the Peer Support Program in Week 2 of next term. All students will be participating in the Moving Forward module which focuses on resilience. The experiences in the module help children to identify their qualities and strengths, develop skills, respond with a range of strategies and seek support when faced with challenges.

In these sessions, students will establish connections with other members of their group and develop a group agreement to help them to work well together. Students will discuss an example of a challenging situation and some resilient and non-resilient responses. Parents and carers might like to discuss with your child what they can do to help them take an active role in the Peer Support Program.

Sydney Visual Art Excursion

Once again this has been a fabulous excursion with a group of focused senior students. It was a busy few days with some long train trips, but it was an exciting adventure to embark on together.

On the first day students orientated themselves with the city by walking our way from Central down to Circular Quay where the Visual Arts group explored our first Gallery. We viewed an exhibition called *The National 2019* which focused on exploring contemporary Australian art. This exhibition ran over three separate spaces.

The first was the MCA, where students were wowed with the diverse range of mediums, material and conceptual practices from current artists. Then on to the *NSW Art Gallery*, but on the way we explored the Botanical Gardens and all were delighted by the cacti gardens. At *NSW Art Gallery* we again explored *The National 2019*, *The Essential Duchamp*, *Archibald*, *Wynne and Sulman Prizes 2019*. After a long day of walking around looking at amazing and diverse artworks we went back to the accommodation, then out to experience Vivid during the evening.



The next day was followed again with a lot more walking and another two Galleries—White Rabbit Gallery where we viewed exhibition *Hot Blood* which was definitively decided as the favourite. It features contemporary Asian art and was a fantastic comparison between the Australian contemporary art of *The National 2019*. Students engaged in an outstanding matter discussing the political climate in which some of the works were made and how these are then represented to the wider audience.

The last Gallery stop was at Carriageworks for the final instalment of *The National 2019*. It was interesting to see how the curating of this Gallery and the works that were exhibited were site specific. Students contemplated how the exhibition came together over the three galleries to create an overall view of contemporary Australian art this year.

The students were all delighted to explore the city and the different things it had to offer, from eating out with an enormous range of different ethnic food, shopping, exploring different suburbs and their environments, the way the built and natural environments converge and the throb and drive of a large city, day and night. It was an amazing experience to be able to share with my students and get them to experience the wider world within society and the art world as a whole.

Nimbin Central School's 2019 'Bundjalung Day' Celebrations

On Monday, to begin Nimbin Central School's NAIDOC Week celebrations, we held our annual Bundjalung Day. This year there was a strong focus on the NAIDOC theme – ‘Voice, Treaty, Truth’ and in involving our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students as cultural leaders within the school.

The day began with Uncle Gilbert Laurie’s ‘Acknowledgement to Country’, a smoking ceremony and his message for the day: Garimaa – the Bundjalung word for ‘respect’.

We broke off into groups – Primary stayed with their regular classes, and Secondary separated into House Groups. They circulated through a variety of activities designed by community members and teachers and also our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students who became leaders for the day. Activities involved:

- Yarning and learning about the local area, with Uncle Gilbert.
- Research about the history and nature of Treaties and what a Treaty might look like in modern day Australia.
- Song-writing with acclaimed local songwriter and teacher Dave Ramsey, where students created modern day rap lyrics for the Yothu Yindi song “Treaty”.
- Learning and performing a variety of contemporary Aboriginal songs.
- Viewing and discussing the ABC documentary: Will Australia Ever Have A Black Prime-Minister?
- Creating a draft banner design for their house-groups – Miwan (eagle), Jullum (fish), Gurumen (kangaroo) and Yumbah (snake) for our Secondary students; Ngamaal (goanna) and Djanbung (playtpus) for our Primary students.
- Traditional Aboriginal games.

We were also very fortunate to have The Rivers Aboriginal Performing Arts (TRAPA) ensemble join us for half of the day. This group, comprised of secondary students from the three Lismore high schools, pride themselves in their ability to tell traditional and modern stories through contemporary dance and music. They danced for our primary students and explained to them the stories within the dances. Then, they taught primary sections of the dances and finally had them perform in front of one another! It was a great way for primary students to actively engage in story-telling and they engaged enthusiastically and with open minds and hearts.

TRAPA performed again for the whole school in the COLA at lunchtime and were met with a huge applause. We thank them, and their supervising teachers, for coming out to join our celebrations.

We sincerely thank Uncle Gilbert Laurie, Uncle Glen Rhodes and other members of our community for making the day a successful celebration and learning experience for our school. Please enjoy new, contemporary ‘Treaty’ lyrics (over the page) as written by the students!


Treaty Rap Lyrics
